

1. Introduction

More fatalities occur with motor vehicles than with any other task or equipment, and careless use of vehicles produces more serious accidents and injuries than any other cause.

2. Rules





A Terra Search vehicle may only be operated by a licensed driver

Drivers must obey all traffic and parking regulations



Payment of Police or Council fines is the driver's responsibility. The same conditions apply for hire vehicles

Current penalties for speeding



- Less than 13 kilometres per hour (km/h) over the speed limit: A\$133 + one demerit point.
- At least 13 km/h but not more than 20 km/h over the speed limit:
 A\$200 + three demerit points.
- More than 20 km/h but not more than 30 km/h over the speed limit:

A\$333 + four demerit points.



 More than 30 km/h but not more than 40 km/h over the speed limit:

A\$466 + six demerit points.

More than 40 km/h over the speed limit:
 A\$933 + eight demerit points and six month suspension.



Don't forget to switch over tanks, always start with the sub tank, then switch to the main tank.



Engine damage can be prevented if temperature and oil pressure gauges are monitored regularly



Failure to follow road rules, drive to conditions and adhere to instructions provided in inductions and by your supervisor is dangerous driving and is not acceptable.

Dangerous driving by any employee will not be tolerated. Irrespective of an employee's driving qualifications any supervisor may forbid an employee to drive a vehicle if the supervisor considers that the employee is a dangerous driver. Dangerous driving can lead to termination of employment.

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• Many of the roads you will travel on are unfenced, poorly maintained (even main roads and highways) and have long stretches that promote fatigue. Ensure you take 15min rest breaks at least every TWO HOURS.

Always drive to road conditions and be realistic about your own experience and abilities.



 Much of Terra Search's work is carried out on dirt roads in remote areas. There is often no signage so you must be alert and aware of conditions and other traffic.

Desirable employees make others feel comfortable about being their passenger.



Any employee who is convicted of a 'driving under the influence' charge in a company vehicle or during work hours will be instantly dismissed.





Every passenger in a company vehicle must wear a properly fastened seat belt while the vehicle is moving (on or off the road).



Passengers are only to ride in the cabin of vehicles and may not, <u>under any circumstances</u> ride on the back of open trucks or utilities.

Vehicles must not be driven faster than the statutory state speed limit. Always drive <u>a lot slower</u> when not on public roads and never take sharp corners at unsafe speeds.



Slow down. Dust may be disguising an oncoming vehicle, pot holes, loose gravel and slippery mud patches.

Turn on your headlights where visibility is poor. Consider stopping if you can't see the road in front of you.

Take it EASY!!!



A significant cause of damage to gearboxes in Company vehicles is caused by simply being in the wrong gear.

- Do NOT use 5th gear (overdrive) when in a town or built up area.
- Overdrive is strictly for highway use only.
- Overdrive gear does NOT give you sufficient power to overtake in a safe manner, change down to overtake.
- Overdrive REDUCES the power available to the engine, remember this when towing uphill etc and do not strain the engine, change down a gear instead.

Every Terra Search vehicle is to be checked daily by the authorised user. Items to be inspected during these checks are listed in Section 4.





All employees must be instructed in safe driving methods and in the recommended methods of jacking, winching and puncture repairs, before they begin field work. All employees are to carry out vehicle operations in the recommended manner.

Don't learn safety by accident



The operation of electronic devices (i.e. MP3, Mobile Phones etc.) is prohibited while driving.



Arrange your MP3 etc. before driving, when stationary and out of traffic.

Keep volume level low and not distracting. Your primary concern is driving safely.

Use hands free on your phone, or deal with it when you stop.

You are driving a vehicle, not in a nightclub.

Have respect for your own life and those of others.




Vehicle Accident Hazards:



Poor Visibility



Emotional Stress



Fatigue

feeling cramped or fidgety; your vehicle wandering on the road; your speed varying; overtaking vehicles startling you; yawning constantly; your mind is wandering; your eyelids are heavy; and you are impatient



Excessive Speed



Mechanical Defects




Driving at a speed which allows the driver to completely stop the vehicle before any unforeseen danger. Learn your vehicles braking distance at various speeds, and drive at a safe speed for the road length visible.

At 100km/hr it takes 85m to stop from the time you apply the brakes. That's 1 1/3 cricket pitches or 3/4 of a rugby field.

Are you driving fast enough to kill someone, or slow enough to walk away...



Drive slowly through a dust cloud and beware of cattle and vehicles which may 'suddenly' appear.



Don't attempt to pass a vehicle which is travelling in a cloud of dust.



In areas of poor visibility (dust, smoke, fog, rain, twilight) switch **HEADLIGHTS** on!

Frequently inspect the car. Check steering and braking systems after each field trip. Repair any faults as soon as they are recognised. Electrical wiring should be checked by an auto electrician.





Driving Position:



Ensure you are in a comfortable and safe driving position



Driving in the Bush:



Avoid travelling fast on rough terrain.

Rocks, creeks and gullies should be crossed with care.



Driving in the Bush:







Cattle and kangaroos are a particular hazard on road verges and care should be taken when driving at dusk or dawn.

Don't swerve to avoid animals – braking in a straight line may help to avoid a rollover.

Driving in the Bush:

The correct speed is that at which the driver has

COMPLETE CONTROL

of the vehicle.

(Remember your braking distance, safety distance, to slow down before sharp corners sufficiently to allow for another vehicle coming from the opposite direction, and that Utilities have a high point of gravity, which makes them susceptible to roll over.)



Beware of Roadtrains:

On one-lane roads and dirt roads PULL OVER AND STOP when Roadtrain is approaching.





Driving in the Bush:





Check the underside of the vehicle at the end of each period of bush driving, to remove grass or sticks caught underneath.



Driving on Open Road:







Do not 'tailgate' under any circumstances!

Keep a safe two second reaction time distance to vehicle ahead of you.

Keeping a safe distance will also reduce the chance of windscreen damage.

Driving on Open Road:






During city driving, most accidents occur at intersections – these need particular care. Pay extra attention, especially if you have been out driving in the bush for a period of time.




